Combined Events Radio Project Rolls Out to Lower Mainland Agencies

The E-Comm radio system is part of an exciting new project that is being implemented across the Lower Mainland. The Combined Events Radio Project (CERP) empowers responders to use the E-Comm radio system's mutual-aid talk groups on a day-to-day basis, to support emergency responders on their way to, and on scene at, events. In short, it allows responders to use the radio system to its full capability and improves daily emergency response.

The CERP began in the City of Richmond through the leadership of the BC Ambulance Service (BCAS), the RCMP, Richmond Fire-Rescue, the City of Richmond Emergency Management Team and E-Comm.

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Vancouver police officers and residents is paramount," says former WVPD Acting Police Chief Barrie Nickerson, who oversaw the transition. "The interoperability provided by the radio system, combined with the increased coverage, are two important features that will enhance emergency response." WVPD's Police Chief, Kash Heed, adds "Being part of this integrated work together."

In addition to enabling direct communication with other police departments and emergency agencies such as the BC Ambulance Service, the E-Comm radio system offers police officers improved communication and safety features such as a wider coverage area, increased reliability and clarity, emergency buttons, and higher peak traffic capacity.

"This is a significant milestone for E-Comm and the policing community," says E-Comm President Ken Shymanski. "In terms of response, there is no more important aspect than communication. This is a major public and officer safety advantage."

WVPD now has 52 portable radios at its disposal, along with 36 mobiles and two base units for dispatchers. More than 6,000 wide-area radios are now active in southwest British Columbia. Currently, the network processes approximately 10 million radio transmissions each month.



Final GVRD Police Agency Joins E-Comm's Radio System

The policing community's vision of an integrated radio system for all police within the GVRD was recently realized when the West Vancouver Police Department (WVPD) joined the E-Comm Wide-Area Radio System. On March 27th, WVPD was the 14th and final police department to come on-board. Now officers can communicate directly with police departments throughout the Lower Mainland. The E-Comm radio system is one of only a handful of fully interoperable radio systems in North America.

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Backing Up Emergency Services – E-Comm establishes reciprocal agreements with service agencies for emergency back-up call taking and dispatch

Emergency service organizations handle emergencies every day. But what happens when those services have their own emergency that jeopardizes their call taking and dispatch abilities? In the past three years, E-Comm has been instrumental in two such events. With the BC Ambulance Services (BCAS) and most recently the Coquitlam RCMP, E-Comm helped temporarily relocate call taking and dispatch to the E-Comm facility. The centralized integration of E-Comm's communication services made these transitions possible and relatively seamless. And more important, it ensured the public could continue to access emergency assistance.

On January 24th, at 1325 hours, Coquitlam RCMP requested that their 9-1-1 calls be directed to E-Comm for call taking and dispatch, in response to an evacuation order from a gas leak in the Coquitlam area. E-Comm's on-duty manager, Richard Traer, immediately rerouted calls for Coquitlam to E-Comm RCMP call-takers and dispatchers. A general radio broadcast was sent to Coquitlam units that dispatch functions were temporarily controlled by E-Comm and a provincial CPIC fan-out was sent to all police agencies.

E-Comm's Ridge-Meadows dispatcher, Jennifer Phillip, who has previous experience in Coquitlam, was re-assigned to assume full command of Coquitlam dispatch. Her dispatch position for Ridge-Meadows was then back-filled by other dispatchers who are cross-trained. All non-emergency callers who dialed 9-1-1 were advised to call back at a later time due to the incident. After approximately one-hour Coquitlam dispatch resumed command, the E-Comm breakout position for Coquitlam dispatch stood down and E-Comm dispatchers returned to their previous posts.

This incident, along with E-Comm's response for the BCAS, is a prime example of the power of integration and common platforms. Because Coquitlam and E-Comm are both on PoliceCAD, the transition of dispatch was relatively smooth. The ability for E-Comm to assume command of radio is possible because of its Wide-Area Radio System. In addition, the ability of E-Comm's operations to shift staffing resources is achievable due to E-Comm's integrated police dispatch approach and cross training.

E-Comm now has formal agreements with several agencies that will see each organization acting as the other's back-up facility on a permanent basis. The back-up arrangements include dedication of a specific area in each facility to accommodate an emergency evacuation (which will be in a ready response state) and an immediate assumption of each other's calls.

Service Levels Maintained Throughout Vancouver Celebration of Light

The Vancouver Celebration of Light festival is always a very busy operational time for emergency services in the Lower Mainland and E-Comm. Every year E-Comm develops a multi-faceted plan for Operations, Wireless and Information Technology. Despite the heavy call volumes on all four firework nights, E-Comm Operations exceeded its 9-1-1 service level mandate of answering 95% of calls in five seconds or less. Service levels for the Vancouver Police Department and the RCMP and Fire detachments that we dispatch for also remained very solid under this heavy call load.
